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HERITAGE & MEMORIES **Public Baths and free** swimming for kids.

Maryborough Chronicle, Thursday 9 Nov 1899, reported the details of a magisterial inquiry into the death of 'Sonny' Groundwater, a promising young 15 year old who drowned saving his cousin, 11, who could not swim.

The tragedy was felt by many, with a memorial committee being formed to place a monument to George Douglas Groundwater, son of Mr. William Groundwater, of 'Laurel Bank,' Tinana. Mr George Ambrose White, a local farmer and businessman donated £1000 to build the public baths at Ma-

ryborough. Mr White stipulated "that the Baths be free to school children of Maryborough and district for all time.." He said that no child should die because they can't swim.

The boy's father, William Groundwater, was in the paddock when he heard desperate screams from his younger children. He saw one boy floating face down, jumped into the water swam back with him to the bank where his wife was, discovering it was his nephew. He swam back in search of his boy, diving desperately for 15 or 20 minutes until his wife called him to come out.

Sonny's brother Douglas, 8, said his brother jumped in and tried to push his cousin into the bank;"Robertson caught hold of my brother round the neck, who swam a little and then went down; my brother, did not come up again; George Robertson kept afloat, and I saw my father take him out of the river.'

The Baths were opened 26 May 1906 and were in use until 1961, with Mr White paying £1400 toward the project. The memorial is in Maryborough cemetery: "A lad of parts, of gentle ways, who strove with all his boyish might, to make his parent's household bright, and strengthen all their happy days"...



MARYBOROUGH, October 20. A boy named George Groundwater was drowned in the river to-day while trying to save his cousin, George Robinson, who had drifted out into deep water in a boat and then jumped into the river. The deceased's father saved the boy Robinson. The deceased was a good swimmer, and gained a School of Arts scholarship last year.

Dickabram Bridge

Firstly, how many of our readers have seen this bridge and driven across it? If you have not, then you will have to wait 4 years to cross, due to major maintenance. All is not lost, however, as you can take your BBQ to the rest stop on the Miva side and enjoy the view of this masterpiece.

The original road bridge across the Mary river at Miva had opened on the 30th October 1878. That bridge was damaged by floods in July 1879 (*note: mid winter!! - climate change was happening then too!*) and swept away by floods in February 1880. A replacement road bridge was swept away by floods in October 1882, and it was then decided by the Government to build a rail bridge that would carry road traffic as well.

The bridge construction was awarded to McDermott Owen & Co in 1884. The bridge was tested in Nov 1886 with a 2-engine train and the line opened for traffic on 6th Dec 1886. The bridge has remained in use without substantial modification work since its completion. Diesel/electric locomotives came into being and the decking was modified by adding a kerb in the 1970s to separate road and rail traffic and to eliminate the need for a gate keeper to control road traffic.

The bridge is 191m long and stands 23m above the Mary River. All spans are metal trusses except for the 11m approach spans which are tied timber girders.

The name of the bridge comes from a local Aboriginal word... (*continued p4*)

The bridge is heritage listed and one of two remaining road and rail bridges in Australia. It is also the oldest remaining large steel truss bridge constructed in Queensland.

GARDENING TIPS BY KAKEN FAWKE

Well spring is finally upon us – cool nights and warm days. If you are looking for better ways to utilize your limited water there is one way to conserve water for growing plants – it is called a wicker bed. The idea of a wicker bed is to draw water up from a reservoir below, hence the word. Wicking the moisture moves through the soil and feeds the roots directly. This idea is great for low rainfall areas. You can build a closed one or raised garden wicker bed.

How to make a wicker bed:Choose a suitable site full sun for veggies. Ensure that it is level. The depth needs to be around 600ml.(300 mm for reservoir/ water zone and 300 mm for growing/ root zone.) Pour about an inch of gravel into the bed for the pipe to sit on.

Install a length of PVC pipe about 50 mm diameter vertically, attached to a PVC 90 degree elbow that will sit near the base of the bed on top of the gravel. Attach a length of 50mm agi pipe or slotted PVC pipe to the elbow and this will run the length of the bed along the centre. Place the cap on the end of the agi pipe. Cover pipe at the bottom of the bed with gravel to total depth of 300 mm max.

Place your overflow pipe at the top of this layer of gravel covering the external end with a small piece of shade cloth or stocking. Add the shade cloth doubled over this layer needs to let water up but prevent soil moving down. Fill the bed with good quality loamy soil with high organic content and mulch well. Fill the water reservoir until water comes through the overflow pipe . Once soil is damp, plant out your wicking bed with your favourite edibles, as the plants roots will draw down to the moisture.

Water less and enjoy seeing how your plants grow. Tomatoes especially grow a great height and produce lots of fruit for your family to eat. Diagram below. Happy Gardening, till next time. *Karen*

Vietnam Veterans' Day and the anniversary of the Battle of Long Tan

August 18, 2017. Llew O'Brien, MP, encouraged us to honour the service and sacrifice of the Australians who served in Vietnam War as the country marked Vietnam Veterans' Day and the Battle of Long Tan.

Nearly 60,000 Australian men and women served in the Vietnam War between 1962 and 1975, including 521 who lost their lives and more than 3,000 wounded.

"August 18 also marks the 51st anniversary of the Battle of Long Tan, which was one of the fiercest battles of the Vietnam War and involved 105 Australians and three New Zealanders of D Company 6RAR," Mr O'Brien said. "A total of 17 Australians were killed in action during the Battle of Long Tan, and 25 were wounded. One of the wounded later died of his injuries."

Mr O'Brien acknowledged the assistance given to D Company with an ammunition resupply by RAAF helicopters, as well as support by Australian, New Zealand and United States artillery and the arrival of reinforcements in APCs.

"We reflect with pride on the members of our community who served in Vietnam, and how their efforts have shaped our country. This is an opportunity for veterans and the community to stand side-by-side, remembering their service and sacrifice," Mr O'Brien said. *O'Brien*

HEALTH AND WELLNESS

International Overdose Awareness Day (IOAD)

IOAD is a global event held on **August 31st** each year, aiming to raise awareness of overdose and reduce the stigma of a drug-related death. It also acknowledges the grief felt by families and friends remembering those who have met with death or permanent injury as a result of drug overdose. Overdose Day spreads the message that the tragedy of overdose death is preventable.

Alcohol Overdose

Alcohol is a legal depressant that slows down the messages travelling between the brain and the body. In small amounts, alcohol can cause you to feel relaxed, more confident and heighten your emotions.

Alcohol depresses the nerves that control involuntary actions such as breathing and the gag reflex (to prevent choking). A fatal dose of alcohol will eventually cause these functions to shut down. Since alcohol is an irritant to the stomach, excessive vomiting is also common. If the person is unconscious, this could lead to death by asphyxiation.

Signs of Overdose •Confusion •Loss of co-ordination •Vomiting •Seizures •Irregular breathing (a gap of more than 10 seconds between breaths) •Slow breathing (less than eight breaths per minute) •Pale or blue tinged skin

Low body temperature (hypothermia)
Unconsciousness or passing out.

Overdose Response •Call an ambulance, advise location, stay on the line. •Keep them warm. •If unconscious, put them in the recovery position. •If awake, keep them in a sitting position and awake. •Be prepared to give CPR if they stop breathing. •If muscle spasms or seizures occur, clear area of objects.

What not to do in the event of a suspected Overdose

•Do NOT leave them to sleep it off. •Do NOT give them coffee. •Do NOT make them sick. •Do NOT walk them around •Do NOT put them in a cold shower. •Do NOT let them drink more alcohol. *www.overdoseday.com*

Council waives tip fees in November "The free weekend is for domestic waste only and encourages residents to clean up around their homes before the storm season,"Disaster Management Portfolio Councillor Rolf Light said. "Waiving the fee will increase its popularity."

It is proposed to hold the Get Ready - Storm Season Clean-up on **Saturday, November 25 and Sunday, November 26.**

"That weekend Council will waive waste disposal charges for all domestic general waste including tyres, mattresses, refrigerators and air conditioning units (gassed or de-gassed)," Cr Light said.

My friends will understand that I have not got the new staff in yet but will advise when this comes into play.

One point I missed was to say a very big thank you to the nurses and staff at St Stephens, you are number one!! *Trevor Keightley*.

Activists have a demonstration in front of the squirrel's house.

The Opposition Minister rants in a radio interview that the squirrel got rich off the backs of grasshoppers, and calls for an immediate tax hike on the squirrel to make him pay his'fair share'.

In response to pressure from the media, the Government drafts the Economic Equity and Grasshopper Anti-Discrimination Act, retroactive to the beginning of the summer. The squirrel's taxes are reassessed.

The Squirrel is taken to court and fined for failing to hire grasshoppers as builders, for the work he was doing on his home and an additional fine for contempt when he told the court the grasshopper did not want to work.

The grasshopper is provided with a Housing Commission house, financial aid to furnish it and an account with a local taxi firm to ensure he can be socially mobile.

The squirrel's food is seized as payment for fines and re-distributed to the more needy members of society - in this case the grasshopper.

Without enough money to buy more food or to pay his newly imposed retroactive taxes, the squirrel has to downsize and start building a new home.

A 60 Minutes special shows the grasshopper finishing up the last of the squirrel's food, though spring is still months away, while the Housing Commission house he is in, crumbles around him because he hasn't bothered to maintain it. The Opposition call for the resignation of the Prime Minister.

The squirrel is told that he will have to work beyond 65 because of a shortfall in government funds.
